
## **Extracting an Image in Photoshop**

- 1. Open the jpg file in Photoshop
- 2. Reset your Quickmask Mode settings to the following:



- 3. Use the Quick Selection Tool (W) to select the person but not the background.
- 4. You can alter the Quick Selection Tools operation to subtract by holding down the option key while clicking.
- 5. You can change the size of the brush you're using by using the bracket keys (next to the letter P on your keyboard) Right Bracket ] –bigger. Left Bracket [ smaller.
- 6. Once you've improved the selection, check it by using Quick Mask type the letter 'Q' to turn on Quick Mask. It should look like this:

- 7. While in quick mask you can use a hard edge paint brush (b) to add to a selection with black paint and subtract from the selection with white paint. Zoom in to look at the detailed edge. Once you've fixed any errors, exit Quick Mask by typing 'Q'.
- 8. Select the Quick Selection tool again (W). At the top of the tool's settings bar is "Select and Mask..." Click on it!
